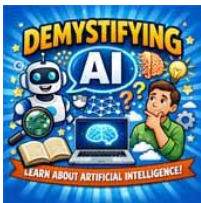

Subject and I.T. Groups

Archaeology and History: This group will meet on Friday 8th May at 10.30am at CURC when Moy will be presenting her talk on "Magic and Medicine (from early inscriptions): What we can learn from excavated objects." This session will look at evidence to show how a belief in magic was part of everyday life in the remote past. Like medicine today it was called upon to aid people and keep them safe. Clay tablets reveal incantations and practices, from how to cure insomnia, to a guide for how to tell a household ghost from a demon who is causing illness), grave goods such as amulets and tokens help us see how magic and medicine were once regarded as interchangeable areas of knowledge. Architecture: May sees the group heading out-of-doors at the start of our summer season of visits.
